Our sea of purple continues to flow



Our support only grows as we continue with our unfair labor practice strike. Many community members and elected leaders have stopped by our strike line to show us their support in our fight for livable wages. The Tri-Cities stand with us in our message to Providence: same employer, same work, same pay!

We are hearing reports from inside the hospital, and it's clear that our skillset and our dedication cannot be easily replaced. But Providence executives made a choice to pay temporary workers 2-3 times more than they pay us instead of settling a contract that recruits us, retains us, and respects our commitment to caring for our Tri-Cities patients.

We also heard that a fellow CNA who went to work was sent home because of overstaffing. Guess who was first to be sent home? You guessed it, our own member. Providence: where is your loyalty to our community?

"I've been here over 21 years. I work nights and weekends because I can't survive on a day shift salary. I'm a single income household and I'm struggling. When I began in healthcare I believed it could be a good job, one you could work your whole career in

and retire from, but that has changed. Providence sends its own employees to collections – we can't even afford healthcare.

I truly hope our strike makes a difference, I hope someone at Providence starts paying attention and sees that something is wrong. Listen to us 'little guys', we are the backbone of this hospital." **Colleen Finley, CNA, 6RP** 

"We need \$25 to survive in this town. I've been here 20 years and I don't make \$25. I've dedicated myself to this hospital. I love this place, it's home, family, and community for me. I care for people. That's why I've been here all this time even though I

don't get paid what I deserve. I do it anyway for my community but I want them to know what's going on at Kadlec. I hardly ever miss a day of work, but I'm missing 7 days for this strike. I'm out here because I have morals, beliefs and because we deserve RESPECT and we know our worth. I want Providence to know that too!" **Judy Montes, Operating Room Assistant**




























## Solidarity forever! Union siblings and electeds join us on the line
