As we stand in our collective power and strength at Providence Kadlec, we're taking a moment to reflect on the resilience and unity we've shown over the past week. Today marks a new chapter in our fight for fair wages and safe staffing after showing Providence we mean business. This Union, Our Union!

At 6 a.m. today, we walked back into our jobs as one strong, united force with our heads held high. However, Providence once again chose intimidation and hostility when they tried to prevent some of us from coming into the hospital unless we were scheduled to work right away. As a union, we don't tolerate retaliation, and we'll be taking steps to call out and address Providence's attempts to intimidate.

This past week has been a powerful reminder of who we are and what we can achieve when we stand together for our values and our patients' rights! We've shown that our voices matter, and that our commitment to a strong contract is unwavering.

We're returning to the bargaining table and bringing everyone's voices for a strong contract that ensures livable wages—not just minimal compensation of pennies. Management has an opportunity to refocus and engage in meaningful dialogue with us.

We will continue to advocate for our patients, a better workplace, and a culture where everyone thrives. Same employer, same work, same pay!

"My family has worked for or with Providence for most of the last 80 years. We have been doctors, nurses, pharmacists, and imaging technologists. They used to take care of us. I have worked for Providence as both nonunion and a union member employee for 20 years. Why can't they figure out that when you take care of your employees financially and with

better benefits, you get much better results across the board? Better staffing, massively less turnover, and overall better things is the result. She could not be here on the line but I am here to demand better for us. I have been here for 8 years and I don't feel valued. It's not right to be paid so little after so many years of service. I am disappointed in my coworkers who could not come and join us, and I am disappointed in the bosses. Even if we have good managers, it doesn't matter. It's about Providence! "It's kind of sad. I rather be in there taking care of my patients, but we need to pay our bills and get safe staffing. I was in Chicago on vacation, but I came back sooner because I need to support my team and everyone else working their tails off. They need to see that

we are serious and fix these unsafe ratios. We come in day in and day out and do a good job. I have been here since 2012 and my team and I are familiar with our patients and know our system very well, but they continue to show that they see us as a number that can just be replaced.
