# **Vote for Alexis Mercedes Rinck for Seattle City Council**



Before we negotiated our last contract, we approached the City Council and let them know how urgent it was to bring the wages up at DESC dramatically, so that we can do this important work and survive in an expensive city. Because of our previous hard work electing City Council members who share our values, their answer was a resounding yes to fund

our wages, and we were able to bring wages up considerably.

A lot has changed since then. Huge corporations and the very wealthy didn't like that the Council taxed them to bring needed services to the community, and they flooded our City Council campaigns with money, and bought themselves a majority of the seats. Our City Council now mostly consists of elected officials who were bought this way, and they are doing exactly what they are being paid to—they are making changes to funding allocations that hurt us and help their rich sponsors. These folks are a threat to DESC because it is the city and county who provide much of the funding that keeps our organization going.

The good news is that we have a candidate this year for City Council who shares our values. Electing her will be key in making sure DESC gets the funding to survive, and we can have the raises we are looking for next time we bargain. We interviewed her last spring and have endorsed her.

Her name is Alexis Mercedes Rinck.

"I will always fight for our human services workers not only because of my work in human services policy and homelessness, but because I believe that all frontline workers that serve our community should be able to afford to live in the city they serve. The needs in the communities we serve are high and our resources aren't scaled to meet the need. In a given day in King County, 16,000 people are experiencing homelessness. And everyday, hardworking human service providers and case managers do the work to house and care for our neighbors. The answer is not divestment because the system is not working.
